From the Rector

Dear Friends

Annual General Meetings are not known for their popularity! But at their best they provide an opportunity to dwell on what has been during any given year, what could have been and what perhaps needs to be done as we move forward. It is not insignificant that our AGM usually falls on this, the last Sunday before Lent. It is a Sunday that in recent years we have marked with the Transfiguration of our Lord, a feast that marks Jesus' revelation as Messiah, the Christ, the Son of God. Jesus who stands in the great tradition of Moses and Elijah – and yet breaks that tradition; nothing in the ancient world speaks of the crucified Messiah, let alone the crucified God.

As we look back and look forward there is much to be thankful for, there is repentance - a recognition of opportunities missed, but there is always a future filled with hope. The Transfiguration speaks into this reality of our world and our place within it. Jesus warns his disciples that this Messiah will have to suffer and die and that they too if they wish to follow will have to bear their own crosses. These crosses come in many ways to us all, from personal disappointments to great catastrophes but in the Transfiguration we see through all this to something better, greater. The words of Jesus about the cross and resurrection to the disciples are

confirmed by the voice from the cloud, listen to him.

Edwin Muir's poem *Transfiguration* concludes:

But he will come again, it's said, though not Unwanted and unsummoned; for all things, Beasts of the field, and woods, and rocks, and seas,

And all mankind from end to end of the earth Will call him with one voice. In our own time.

Some say, or at a time when time is ripe.

Then he will come, Christ the uncrucified,

Christ the discrucified, his death undone,

His agony unmade, his cross dismantled—

Glad to be so—and the tormented wood

Will cure its hurt and grow into a tree

In a green springing corner of young Eden,

And Judas damned take his long journey backward

From darkness into light and be a child

Beside his mother's knee, and the betrayal

Be quite undone and never more be done.

Today we celebrate the Baptism of Chidera Joel Onyems. We welcome him into the Body of Christ, with the sign of the cross and the anointing with the oil of Chrism. The Chrism, consecrated by the Bishop symbolizes the gift of the Spirit, which unites lover and beloved, Father and Son. Revealed on the Mount of Transfiguration and here today at the font at St Philip's.
